STUDENT SPEAKOUT

Ms. Amy Vargas-Tonsi, Student Trustee, stated that she had some concerns about Resolution 0102-05, regarding student trustee voting rights. The first concern was that there were too many issues discussed in the resolution. There are at least three distinct things that are being addressed and these may be better addressed in three separate resolutions. Next, speaking from the standpoint of a student trustee, Ms. Vargas-Tonsi stated that she is able to voice her opinions, and she does participate meaningfully [as stated in the resolution]. Also, Ms. Vargas-Tonsi, stated that historically Ohio University has had a very high quality of student trustees. Another issue of concern was that the resolution was a bit vague. "Is this talking about Ohio University or all of Ohio?...It needs to be made specific."

Ms. Vargas-Tonsi, wanted to make it clear to everyone that the student trustee application process is very rigorous; which gives the candidate that is chosen credibility and responsibility. Basically, Ms. Vargas-Tonsi believes that most of the benefits that the author's of this resolution believe will come from the ability to vote are already in effect for the student trustees.

Also, as a last note, Ms. Vargas-Tonsi would like to make the note that student trustee's are not the advocate of the students. They represent the entire community, faculty, and student body.

SENATORS' REPORTS

Ms. Kristen Flanagan, Academic Affairs Commissioner, said the Dean's Roundtable would be held October 6th, 10 a.m. to noon in Lindley.

Mr. Jeevon Harris, Black Affairs Commissioner, said that beginning next Monday the BAC would begin surveying students of color to see why the numbers of multicultural students are decreasing. These efforts will continue to take place for the rest of the month to be concluded by a meeting with university administrators to inform them of what part the university as a whole is playing in the problem. I will also hold a meeting with the president of multicultural organizations to see what efforts they can take to solve this problem as well. In addition, the BAC is still looking for more members and we have now found our new vice-commissioner. A junior named Othni Jurist. Our first official meeting will be this Sunday at 4:30p.m. in the Senate office. We are trying to set up meetings with Erik Perry, Janice Edwards, Stacey Brinkley, and Venetia Lambert to try to develop some solutions to the declining number of multicultural students.

Mr. Greg Hall, City and County Legislative Affairs Commissioner, said the city is working on zoning. City council candidate's elections are either 17th or 24th.

International Affairs

Mr. Scot Gerding, LGBT Commissioner, said OUTWeek 2001 is Oct. 6-13; we went over the finalized schedule. It kicks off on Saturday with Diversity Rocks concert in Front Room at 3p.m. and continues through October 13th. Projects for the year include: meetings with GLOBE about domestic partner benefits, working on possibilities of a GLBT studies program, working on transgender bathroom issues, and getting more paid hours in the LGBT programs office. Mike Martinez is the new appointed vice-commissioner. We began a list of suggested speakers for pride week and are beginning to research the possibility of having certain ones come for pride week.

Mr. Shawn Temper, Minority Affairs Commissioner, said that he met with Charles Bird last Thursday who helped him brainstorm about visiting regional campuses. He would like to try to set up a Dean's Advisory Board for each regional campus, contact Post to get coverage of events at regional campuses, the student government is in place in the Southern campus and I would like to visit with them to see whether or not it deals with lobbying or event planning, and he is scheduling a meeting with the GSS minority and international affairs commissioner to work together to get more accomplished. The first campus tour is the Lancaster Campus and the possible dates are Oct. 17, 24, Nov. 14, 21. He would like to meet with other commissioners to start planning the Diversity Week and the Diversity Roundtable. Commission meetings are Thursday's from 7-8p.m. in the Senate office.

Mr. Simon Welling, Off Campus Housing Commissioner, said that his commission did not meet this week but will meet again next week and will really delve into our Off Campus Housing Awareness Campaign. They are working on a follow-up to the problems that occurred at the University Courtyard and hope that within the next couple of weeks we can create a resolution regarding the landlord surveys that were started last year.

Ms. Christy Frank, Residence Life Commissioner, announced that plans for the Halloween Information Program are coming along. It is Oct. 29th at 7p.m. in Morton 235. Jen Sanson will tell more in her report. Sarah Weigel and Garry Gross have done a great job collecting information about meal plan options at other universities. They will be meeting with several administrators to discuss their findings. We hope to have a presentation and a resolution up sometime in November. The lighting walk is scheduled for Oct. 15th at 10p.m. We will be checking areas that need better lighting. If there is a particular area you feel needs a light please email me and let me know. We have been communicating with Facilities Management about poor lighting in the West Green garages. A meeting with Greg Hopkins is scheduled for Monday Oct. 22nd to discuss Dining Services.

Mr. Josh Wolf, State and Federal Legislative Affairs Commissioner, said he met with the state trustee and spoke again with Rep. Salerno about Student Trustee Voting Rights Research. Criminal Justice Research and contacts are underway. Research of BAMN: decided to research affirmative action within the higher education system, decided it would not be in the best interest of Ohio University to sponsor a trip to Cincinnati based upon the current safety problems, and still looking into and hopefully combined with Minority Affairs, Black Affairs, LGBT Affairs, and International Affairs Commissions, we may advocate petitions in support of this issue, of course based on a resolution, not yet created to support such an action. Freedom Support Act of 1992 has to do with Armenia Government and recent terrorist acts. Nicole is looking into it. More information to follow. Two hopeful new members. Commission meetings Tuesdays Room 330 at 9p.m.

Ms. Colleen Doughty, Student Activities Commissioner, said that this week's meeting will consist of the second part of the training program. We also welcome two new SAC at-larges to the general body.

Ms. Jen Sanson, University Life Commissioner, said that the Halloween Information Program is Oct. 29th at 7p.m. in Morton 235. PR is in progress. Fliers will be going up the start of next week. Post ads will go in on the 26th and 29th. Also an ad will hopefully be on cat vision a week prior to the program. Mike Waterhouse and I will be having a sit down meeting tomorrow at 5:30p.m. to discuss bobcat cash. We will both be meeting with Randy Shelton on Tuesday of next week to discuss the direction in which we will go with it. Aaron is going to be working on parking, regarding making payments over the phone. We are doing a walk around campus Oct. 15th at 10p.m. to see where lighting improvements need to be made. We will be looking into the price of Baker Center Catering in relation to student

organizations again. Due to concerns, we are looking into getting out the message that the Halloween celebration is going to be the weekend of November 3rd. University Life will be having our commission meeting tomorrow at 5 p.m. up in the offices.

Ms. Pennilane Webb, Women's Affairs Commissioner, said they have new members of the commission. She is working on preliminary ideas for TBTN. She is still working on the project with Hudson and its services. She has an idea about alternative health for women. She has a meeting with Susan Burgess.

1. *Whereas:* Ohio Student Trustees do not have the right to vote, and
2. *Whereas:* Ohio Legislation limits the ability of Ohio Student Trustees to participate meaningfully in
3. the decision making process by exclusion of student trustees from executive session,
4. and
5. *Whereas:* Ohio Student Trustees are not required, or always offered, to attend trustee training
6. programs, leaving the success or failure of student trusteeship dependant on the goodwill
7. of individual university boards, and
8. *Whereas:* Ohio Student Trustees are not selected in a unified process statewide, and
9. *Whereas:* Student Trustees bring a unique perception of university life to the Board of Trustees, and
10. *Whereas:* Ohio University Student Trustees are selected and appointed by the Governor of Ohio,
11. chosen through a thorough application process, and
12. *Whereas:* The Ohio University Board of Trustees make important decisions concerning the welfare
13. of Ohio University, which directly affect the lives of Ohio University students, and
14. *Whereas:* The Ohio University Board of Trustees final decisions are made and implemented with
15. unequal weight, due to the fact that student trustees do not have voting rights, and

Mr. Josh Wolf, Commissioner for State and Federal Legislative Affairs, stated, ladies and gentlemen, senators and executives, and most importantly OU students: Representative Salerno and I spoke on the phone during the summer about this very issue. "Universities are set up to serve students: Students are the ones that live the campus day to day, Trustees do not experience this." This is the fundamental point of why universities have student trustees, a representation quite unlike views of the board of trustee members, student trustees represent the university, the community and the views of the students. I ask you, "What aren't student trustees?" Student Trustees are not student empowerment, they are not here to serve students will, they are not here to cater to university administration and they are not here to only represent the university and community, but also the students. A board of trustee member is someone who represents and has the right to decide what is in the best interests of the university. A student trustee is someone who represents but does not have the right to decide what is in the best interest of the university, the community, or the students. As Senator Mallory said, "Student Trustees have the experience needed to be a trustee, student trustees are highly educated, highly intelligent, contain a vast amount of knowledge, are the cream of the crop, and are some of the universities best leaders." There are many concerns surrounding if and why the student trustees should have a right to vote. These concerns are student empowerment, student trustees voting in irrational, uneducated and emotional ways, first year student trustee credibility and whether or not fighting for this cause, even though it has little opportunity to pass the house and close to no opportunity to pass the senate. I have previously answered the student empowerment issue, student trustees are here to represent the best views of the university, community and students. They are not here to be the student government, the student senate, they are not there to advocate student opinions, however they are there to represent the university, community, AND students. They understand this principle through the thorough selection process, and accept it when they become the student trustees. They are capable and required to be a student trustee for the benefit of the university as a whole, not student advocacy. As for the issue of first year student trustees voting privileges, it is rather simple. We, as a senate, should support student trustees to represent the university, community and students, just as the state of Ohio did to elect 18 yr. old Representative Derrick Seaver. By the way, he creates law, and votes to make Ohio a better state. As for the last area of concern, why are we doing this? To get it through the house? the senate? our board of trustees? No, ladies and gentleman, No senators and executives, No students! We are passing this resolution because it is the right thing to do, it says that the student trustees of Ohio are not superficial representation, they do represent the university, they do represent the community and they do accept the responsibility of representing the students. There is a need for student to have equal weight on the board of trustees, it is this need that demands that the Ohio University Student Senate pass OU Senate resolution 0102-05.

Ms. Jen Sanson, University Life Commissioner, says she believed strongly in this resolution. I realized that the student trustees are listened to but an opinion can be heard but not acted on.

Mr. Jeevon Harris, Black Affairs Commissioner, said we (BA) are supporting this and Student Trustee's should be able to vote.

Mr. Tim Norris, Senator for Fine Arts, stated that there are two points that he would like to address. First, why should Student Senate support student trustee voting privileges anyway? Because they are students, and they represent the students. It is Student Senates mission that we believe the students, and in this case and the student trustees, have the right and obligation to participate in the formulation and application of university policy. The board of trustees is the body in which this policy is made, and currently our student trustees are unable to fully participate in the formulation and adoption of this policy. The decisions that the board makes will have a positive or negative impact on the students at large, and those students not only deserve a voice, but they deserve a direct impact on the decision making process. Where in this lies the need for student trustee voting rights.

The student trustees job is to take an objective view of what the university and the community needs when it comes to the uprising issues, but as students they add a different perspective to the board. This is the perspective that we the Student Senate so actively promote, the students' perspective. That is why we should be in full support of this resolution.

Lastly, I do not believe that the respective year or age of the student trustee should be a factor in his or her right to vote. Both trustees go through the same application and interviewing process, and they are both chosen with the highest regard of their abilities and experience. In the end it comes down to the reason why we have a board of trustees rather than one person making the decisions in the first place. The purpose of a board is to pull together diverse ideals and perspectives on issues to make decisions that will best fit the people in which they will have an impact. The actual trustees themselves are all different. They come from different backgrounds, different fields of study, different ages, and different levels of experience, yet they all have voting privileges. Two student trustees rather than one must be chosen for the same reason, to have representation of different ideals, and backgrounds. These two students put in the same amount of work as the other board members, and they are there for the same reasons for it is their right to vote.

Mr. Greg Hall, City and County Affairs Commissioner, says I propose a friendly amendment to say "...the senior student trustee voting rights...", line 17.

Ms. Kristen Flanagan, Academic Affairs Commissioner, seconds the motion to an amendment.

Mr. Greg Hall, City and County Affairs Commissioner, says most people have one member voting. Fresh idea.

Mr. Josh Wolf, State and Federal Affairs Commissioner, says there is no reason why one trustee is better than the other.

Mr. Greg Hall, City and County Affairs Commissioner, says Barry and Amy said they wouldn't have been comfortable voting their first year.

Cons for the Amendment:

Mr. Kevin Rosenberg, Senator At-Large, says he doesn't see the point of having just one student trustee be able to vote.

Mr. Tom Nguyen, Osteopathic Senator, asks do we vote on what is right or what we think we can achieve.

Ms. Jen Sanson, University Life Commissioner, says that if you are picked to be a trustee you should have the right to vote. You aren't going to apply for this if you don't feel comfortable or capable. They should be able to vote.

Ms. Kristen Flanagan, Academic Affairs Commissioner, says that if we are going to vote yes on this resolution, after a year the trustee will be more able.

Debate is closed.

There is a motion to vote on the proposed amendment.

There is a second to that motion.

In the opinion of the chair, the nay's have it.

Debate begins.

Mr. Jim Hintz, President, asks for pros and cons, two of each.

Cons:

Ms. Christy Frank, Residence Life Commissioner, asked what advantage do we have when trustees seek student viewpoints? Trustees seek these opinions and STVR causes tension and hurts what we have. Do not move hastily.

Pros:

Mr. Kevin Rosenburg, Senator At-Large, says that being disenfranchised we can talk, but they are not going to listen. If I don't want to voice my opinion things would not get done. If you don't get your voice across, nothing will ever get done. One voice, one vote.

Cons:

Ms. Kristen Flanagan, Academic Affairs Commissioner, says that she is not against the spirit of the resolution. It covers three different issues and three separate resolutions would better serve the issue. Also, the wording could be different. Our job is to advocate for OU, not statewide issues.

Pros:

Mr. Simon Welling, OCH Commissioner, says we should definitely and we need to vote for this resolution. If you vote no we are selling ourselves short. We have researched it thoroughly and a student will have it better this way.

Ms. Alissa Galford, Director of Communications, comments that this is not a hasty resolution. We passed a resolution similar to this one last year. OSG is a state thing but we must get support from OU.

Mr. Garry Gross, South Green Senator, says that he is not against the idea of student trustees, but the length, wording, and all of the issues are too much.

Mr. Mike Waterhouse, Special Assistant to the President, said the Board of Trustees is what you are voting on. Do you think a student should be able to vote on issues that affect them? Who would you rather have representing you?

Ms. Kristen Flanagan, Academic Affairs, Commissioner, says she wants everyone to know that a no vote is not against the idea only against the poor. The future issue is about state trustees. I don't see this resolution going anywhere.

Mr. Kevin Rosenberg, Senator At-Large, said you are wasting your vote if you vote no. If you say maybe it won't go through, what does that have to do with us. At least we care if you think about it.

Debate closed.

There is a motion for a roll call vote.

There is a second.
